Timeline Response 1921-1938

In the Tulsa Riot, African Americans were becoming rich and living the life until the Ku Klux Klan started spreading and taking down the African Americans. The black people were becoming very upset about this and many white people were calling them names like, "Black Wall Street" and many more. And the white people were triggered when they heard corrupted news. This took place in 1921.

In 1917, the black people were named The Harlem Renaissance and all the cultural, social, and artistic explosion. They wanted to move away from the south, spread fled it's oppressive caste system, and wanted to express their talents. They didn't want to feel like slaves, they wanted to be free.

The Moore v. Dempsey was a major victory for NAACP in 1923. 12 black farmers from Arkansas were sentenced to death for allegedly killing white people. The 5 white men were killed and Elaine, Arkansas riot of 1919. Some of them were accidentally shot by white people. Over 700 blacks were arrested, 67 went to prison, and 12 farmers were tried by a all white jury.

The great depression began in 1929, hard times came to a lot of people, alot more towards the blacks than the white. Many people went into debt, lost jobs, leaving behind homes and farms. Black men couldn't get a job, and they couldn't get a job unless the white men had one first.

"Scottsboro boys"

Nine black youths were charged with raping two white women in Alabama. This case showed the real treatment of blacks.
